The dinner speaker will be Dr. Ivor van Heerden, author of *The Storm-What Went Wrong and Why during Hurricane Katrina - the Inside Story from One Louisiana Scientist.*

Dr. Ivor van Heerden is both the former deputy director of the Louisiana State University (LSU)

Hurricane Center and director of the Center for the Study of Public Health Impacts of Hurricanes, a Louisiana Board of Regents Health Excellence Fund Center. He was also a faculty member of the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering at LSU. He held these positions until being fired by the University in 2009 for resisting attempts to stifle academic freedom at LSU. Dr. van Heerden reached an out of court settlement with LSU early 2013 and he now resides in the Northern Neck of Virginia.

A native of South Africa, he received his

undergraduate degrees in geology from the University of Natal in South Africa, and a masters and doctorate in Marine Sciences from LSU. He is a former Assistant Secretary of the Louisiana Department of Natural Resources where he ran a very successful coastal wetlands restoration program. Ivor has been involved in natural disaster research projects in various parts of the world and played a key part in the dissemination of information on the impacts of Hurricane Katrina during the emergency. He led the State of Louisiana's official forensic data gathering team as concerns the failure of the levees in New Orleans and the consequences for those who lost their homes.

Dr. van Heerden will speak about what an author needs to know before publishing a controversial work. He has undertaken thousands of interviews and appeared in many documentaries including Harry Shearer's *The Big Uneasy*, Spike Lee's HBO documentaries as well as in other productions by amongst others; NOVA-PBS, History Channel, Discovery Channel, National Geographic and BBC.

THE WILLIAMSBURG BOOK FESTIVAL



The Williamsburg Book Festival is gearing up for its second year and CBW can play a big part in its success.

The number of authors wanting to participate in last year's festival was encouraging. We filled up quickly and had a long waiting list. Thank you to everyone who participated and attended.

To provide a varied festival to the readers and writers in the area, we have made some adjustments in the process.

New location: Bruton Parish's Lewis Hall— Lewis Hall is in the Bruton Parish House on Duke of Gloucester (DOG) Street. The Parish House is next door to the William & Mary Bookstore.

The new location will bring more foot traffic. The day of the Book Festival—Saturday, September 20—DOG Street will have the Farmers' Market, the Plein Air Festival, a craft show, and it is Family Weekend at William & Mary.

Lewis Hall holds more tables than the Community Building. We'll have space for more authors.

Author Participation:

Last year was our first Book Festival, and the selection of book categories varied, but we were short in a few areas. Some additional authors and books approached the festival—after we had filled—with wide-ranging subjects that would have attracted additional customers.

Because of the demand to participate and to ensure a diversity of subjects, we will *jury* the selection of genres and books. The selection process will be based on offering the festival attendees with an assortment of subjects/genres, high-quality books, and authors who are serious about their craft—both experienced and emerging.

Book Sales: This year, authors will be responsible for providing their inventory, selling their books, and paying their sales tax.

Volunteers: The Festival can use CBW members' talents!

Sponsorships—we need sponsors to keep the costs to authors as low as possible. Sponsors will allow us to advertise to bring in more buyers/readers. By Leah Price from *Daily Press* article: "Among these (self-published in 2012) are two by **Jeff Drifmeyer,** of Williamsburg, who spent the better part of a year shopping his first manuscript to traditional publishing houses and literary agents before deciding to self-publish. At some point you just need to move (your) written work and get on with the next step"

Writing as Jake McKenzie, Drifmeyer has published two books, a thriller, When Pigs Flu and a work of

narrated nonfiction, *Civil War Comes Home*. For both he used the services of a for-fee publishing company. "Indie can work," he wrote. "For minimal, up-front expenditures, my works are published and selling. I probably would not have that if still trying to break in to traditional publishing with a major house."

Jim Ducibella wrote the Writers in Style column for the June issue of *Chesapeake Style*.

Jet Fuel Review, a new online literary journal, published Trading Up, a short story by **Sarah Collins Honenberger**, in its premier issue on April 25, 2014. Her novel, Minding Henry Lewis, has been selected as one of 100 quarter-finalists for the 2014 Amazon Breakthrough Novel Award, General Fiction category, out of more than 10,000 entries internationally. Finalists will be announced in mid-June.

Gail Wilson Kenna is a finalist in the Iowa Review's annual creative non-fiction contest. Her essay, *One Face Among the Shadow of Millions* was selected from among 250 entries and sent with other finalists to the judge, David Shields. Announcement of the winner should be in early June. This same essay won second in the PEN Soul-Keats 2013 intercultural essay Gail read from this essay in March at Koret auditorium in San Francisco during the Soul-Keats awards.

VIRGINIA WRITERS CLUB 2014 GOLDEN NIB STATEWIDE WRITING CONTEST

The Golden Nib is the Virginia Writers Club annual two-tier contest. Only the first-place winners from each of the ten VWC Chapters are eligible for the state-wide contest, so there are only 30 entries in the State competition, ten for each category—Fiction, Nonfiction and Poetry.

If you are a member in good standing with both Chesapeake Bay Writers and the Virginia Writers Club, you're eligible to compete in the Golden Nib Contest. (VWC application and check for annual dues of \$30 may be submitted with your entry if you're not yet a member.)

First place CBW winners in each category will receive a Chapter prize of \$25 to be presented at our September 17 lunch meeting. Those three winners will be entered into the statewide finals. Statewide Awards for each category are: First Place-\$100; Second Place-\$50; Third Place-\$25.

Winners of state-level contest will be announced and awards presented at the VWC Annual Meeting on November 1st. Awards for each category: First Place-\$100; Second Place-\$50; Third Place-\$25.

Contest Rules:

Entries will be accepted on any subject the author or poet chooses in the categories of Fiction, Nonfiction and Poetry.

Manuscripts must be the original, unpublished work of the entrant, and must not have won a prize at any level in any other competition. The VWC State competition now allows entries published in your personal blogs. Writing published in blogs other than your own or on social network sites or in an online publication is ineligible and should not be submitted.

Entrants may submit only one entry per category of fiction, non-fiction, poetry.

Fiction and non-fiction—3,500 word





Format: Detachable cover sheet including author's name, address, telephone number, email address (if available), category (fiction, non-fiction, poetry) and title.

Header Required: All other pages must show contest category, title and page number in the header. If the author's name appears on any page of the manuscript other than the cover sheet, the entry will be disqualified.

Fictions and Nonfiction entries must be printed in a plain, legible font such as Times New Roman in 12-to 13- pitch on 8 ½ by 11-inch white paper, double-spaced, with one-inch margins top, bottom and left, and a ragged right margin.

Poetry entries must be printed in a plain, legible font such as Times New Roman in 12-to 13- pitch on 8 ½ by 11-inch white paper, single-spaced, with one-inch margins top, bottom and left, and a ragged right margin.


