raises nagging questions about soldiers who are not only shortchanged in war, but who never had a fair deal before they wore the uniform. This is a story readers will not easily forget." The book is available on Amazon, Barnes and Noble, and in all eBook formats.

Barbara McLennan has been invited to participate in the Hampton History Museum's special exhibit on *The Truth about Women: Myth and Reality*, on July 15, from 11:30 a.m. to 1 p.m. The lecture will be preceded by a book signing for two books, *The Wealth of Jamestown* and *The Wealth of Virginia*. *The Wealth of Virginia* will be available by the end of June. Book signings for *The Wealth of Jamestown* will be held at the William and Mary College Book Store on February 14 (2-6 p.m.) and February 21 (10 a.m.-2 p.m.).

Jerry Peill's *The Curious Case of the Conjure Woman* is out. The Richmond Times Dispatch Virginia Book Notes of 1/11/15 describe his book as "part farce, part detective story and part anthropological exploration into the folkways of a culture and way of life that is slipping away." Set in 1968, it follows an alienated young British folklorist's culture clash with the hard-headed folk in the Virginia Appalachian holler of fictional Caney Forks, and the non-stop battle of wits that ensues. 



