University Press. She has won two awards for short fiction and the Screenwriting Prize at the Charlottesville Film Festival, for her screenplay *Queen Esther*.





Driving Directions To The Kilmarnock Inn From Williamsburg: take I-64 W and exit at VA-30, Exit 227, toward West Point/Toano. Merge onto VA-30 toward West Point/Barhamsville. Turn right onto VA-273/Farmers Drive. Turn Right onto Etham Road/VA-33/VA-30. Continue on VA-33. Turn left onto George Washington Memorial Hwy US-17N/NA-33. Continue on US-17 N/VA-33. Keep right at the fork to go on VA-33. Take the 2nd right onto General Puller Hwy/VA-33 (Saluda). Continue on VA-33 and turn left at Greys Point Rd/VA-3, and travel on to Kilmarnock. When you enter Kilmarnock, turn right at the 2nd stop light, E Church Street/VA-200. The Kilmarnock Inn, 354 E. Church Street is on the right.

From Gloucester, Mathews or Middle Peninsula take VA-3 North to Kilmarnock. When you enter the town of Kilmarnock, Turn right onto E Church Street/VA-200 (second stop light) and The Kilmarnock Inn, 354E Church Street is on the right.


Vampire Resurrection

He has written numerous short stories, published seventy-one articles in a jazz club monthly periodical, has completed a novella, memoir, three novels, and currently working on a fourth novel. His first novel won grand prize in the Maryland Writer's Association yearly novel contest, and he served as a novel contest judge for five years. Vic has attended many conferences, workshops, critique groups, college writing courses, and writer retreats and looking forward to more.

Vic and Jenny are delighted to be relatively new residents of Williamsburg, Virginia, where they serve as staff for their orange tabby, *Crickett*.

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

Directions to Mathews Yacht Club From Richmond or Williamsburg

I-64 East to Exit 220 (Route 33 East, West Point) 19 mi on Route 33 to Intersection Routes 33, 17, & 198 (7-11 on far left corner) Cross 17...you are now on Route 198 4.4 miles on Route 198 to T-intersection. Turn Left onto Route 198. 15 miles to Route 223 in Hudgins. (Just past Donk's Theater, turn at 7-11 on corner) Left on Route 223 approx ½ mile to Crab Neck Road on right. Right on Crab Neck Road to Yacht Club Road (2nd road on right) Right on Yacht Club Road to end, club on the right.

From Norfolk and the Peninsula

I-64 West to first Ft Eustis Blvd exit (Yorktown)

Exit ramp to traffic light - turn left at light. Move immediately to the right to turn right on Ft Eustis Blvd. Ft Eustis Blvd to light at Rte 17. Left onto Rte 17. Continue North over Coleman Bridge to Gloucester Court House turnoff (Business 17 - just past Wendy's on right.) Bear right on Bus 17, go about 2 miles to traffic light at Rtes 3 and 14. Right at light onto Rte 14 to T-intersection at Rte 198. Rte 198 to Rte 223 at 7-11. Turn right toward Gwynn's Island. Go approx ½ mile on 223 to Crab Neck Road on right. Right on Crab Neck Road to Yacht Club Road (2nd road on right). Right on Yacht Club Road to end, club on the right.

From **Kilmarnock, Northern Neck:** Follow Route 3 to Route 198. See above.


